

Introduction and welcome



Rosa Weber

President of the Supreme Court and of the National Council of Justice (Brazil)

She joined the labor judiciary in 1976. In 1991, she was promoted by merit to the position of judge of the Regional Labor Court of the 4th Region, which she presided from 2001 to 2003. In 2004, she was summoned to work at the Superior Labor Court and, in 2006, she took office as Minister of the Superior Labor Court. In 2011, she was appointed to the Federal Supreme Court and became the first career female judge to compose the Supreme Court. In May 2016, she took over as effective Minister of the Superior Electoral Court, having served as substitute Minister since June 2012.



Katyna Argueta

United Nations Development Program Representative (Brazil)

A diplomat with more than 30 years of experience in the international field, she joined UNDP in Honduras as an Advisor to the Representation and worked as Deputy Country Director in Panama, Deputy Country Director in Haiti, Director of Country in Mexico. Since 2019, she has been a Resident Representative in Brazil. Has worked at the Honduran Ministry of Foreign Affairs, at the Honduran Embassy in London (United Kingdom) and at the Mission of Honduras to the Organization of American States in Washington (USA). In addition, she worked for 8 years in the private sector in the insurance industry and financial. Her background includes studies in Management and Administration at I.N.C.A.E. and graduation from Andres Bello Diplomatic Academy in Chile.



Rafael Velasco

National Secretary for Penal Policies (Brazil)

Specialist in Criminal Law and Public Prison Management, he is a penal police officer. He has served as Undersecretary of State for Penitentiary Administration of Maranhão state, deputy secretary of Penitentiary Service and Humanization, Deputy Secretary of Logistics and Penitentiary Innovation and advisor to Institutional Modernization at the Secretary of State for Administration Maranhão State Penitentiary. He was also a Prison Training advisor and chief advisor to the Superintendence of Prison Security at the Undersecretariat for Prison Administration of Mines General. Head of the National Secretariat for Penal Policies (Senappen) of the Ministry of Justice and Public Security since February 2023.

Associate Professor in the Department of Justice Studies at the University of Regina, Canada. He continues to publish in areas of corrections and community justice; green criminology; the broader socio-politics of judicial reasoning; and knowledge and justice. He is the author of *Portable Prisons: Electronic Monitoring and the Creation of Carceral Territory* (McGill-Queen's University Press, 2022) and with Richard Jochelson, has recently co-edited *Green Criminology and the Law* (Palgrave Macmillan, 2022). Current research interests include gender-based violence against the 2SLGBTQ+ community inside and outside prisons; the folding of religious spaces upon carceral spaces through Muslim prisoner experiences; and correctional officer mental health and wellbeing.

His special interest is comparative probation, the use of technology in criminal justice, reentry and interventions with justice-involved clients. Ioan is one of the editors of the *Probation in Europe* (WOLF) and the *Understanding penal practice* (Routledge) and the author of *Core Correctional Skills. The Training Kit* (www.corecorrectional.eu). The last book is also translated into Portuguese. He is also one of the co-editors the *European Journal of Probation*.



Hannah Graham

Senior Professor in Criminology, University of Stirling (United Kingdom)

Senior Lecturer in Criminology and an Associate Director of the Scottish Centre for Crime and Justice Research (SCCJR) at the University of Stirling, UK. She also holds a public appointment as a member of the Scottish Sentencing Council, an independent advisory body. Dr Graham's work as a criminologist in Europe and Australia has focused on electronic monitoring technologies, probation and community justice, rehabilitation and desistance from crime, comparative research, justice policy and penology. She is an author or editor of four books, including 'Innovative Justice' (Graham and White, 2015) and 'The Routledge Companion to Rehabilitative Work in Criminal Justice' (Ugwudike, Graham, McNeill, Raynor, Taxman and Trotter, 2019). Dr Graham was part of a European comparative research project on uses of electronic monitoring as an alternative to imprisonment in England & Wales, Scotland, Belgium, Germany, and the Netherlands (Hucklesby, Beyens, Boone, Dunkel, McIvor and Graham, 2016).

Law degree from the State University of Mato Grosso do Sul, Master of Law from UNB, PhD candidate in Law at the University of São Paulo, specializing in Constitutional Law from ABDConst, MBA in NLP and high-performance leadership, judge of the Court of Justice of the Federal District and Territories (TJDFT), currently serving as instructor judge at the Cabinet of Minister Edson Fachin, at the Federal Supreme Court (STF), professor of Constitutional Law and Administrative Law at the Federal District School of Magistrates, former vice-president of the Association of Brazilian Magistrates, co-founder of the National Meeting of Black Judges - ENAJUN and the National Forum of Judges against Racism and All Forms of Discrimination - FONAJURD, co-creator of the Speaking Right Project, President of the Multidisciplinary Commission for Inclusion at TJDFT, member of the Commission of Jurists of the Chamber of Deputies for reviewing anti-racist legislation, member of the Commission for the Promotion of Rational Equality in the Electoral Process at TSE, former President of AMAGIS-DF, serving in the biennia of 2016/2018 and 2018/2020.



James Kilgore

Research Director, Challenging E-Carceration Project, Media Justice (USA)

Activist, researcher and author based in Urbana, Illinois, USA. He is the author of six books, four of which he drafted during his six years in prison in the US. He began researching electronic monitoring in 2009 when he was put on a monitor for a year. In 2017 he won a Soros Justice Fellowship to develop a project called Challenging E-Carceration at the nonprofit MediaJustice. This project developed a critical narrative labeling electronic monitoring as a racially biased alternative form of incarceration, not an alternative to incarceration. Kilgore has written widely on electronic monitoring, criminal justice and the political economy of southern Africa and provided support to organizations and individuals fighting to reduce the harm done by electronic monitors.



Emmet Sanders

Researcher/Advocate, Media Justice (USA)

Emmett Sanders is a critically impacted researcher, advocate, author and co-author of several publications including *Cages Without Bars: Pretrial Electronic Monitoring Across the United States*. He has been Project Researcher on MediaJustice's Challenging E-Carceration and Unshackling Freedom campaigns since 2017. His work, which is centered in the lived experiences of those impacted, explores the ever-expanding use of electronic monitoring in immigration and criminal legal systems in the US, and the far reaching, disproportionate, and often devastating effects of these systems on individuals and communities. In addition to his work on electronic monitoring, Sanders is a voting rights advocate who's report *Full Human Beings* outlines the racialized history of targeted criminalization and felony-based disenfranchisement as a tool of White Supremacy and argues for an end to incarcerated voter disenfranchisement in the U.S. He holds a Master of Public Affairs from the University of Texas Rio Grande Valley and resides in Edinburg, Texas (USA).



Alessandra Coelho

Director, Superintendence of Drug Policies and Support for Vulnerable Groups Bahia State (Brazil)

Liam is currently developing research into the rise of electronic monitoring in New Zealand.

Since 2019 he has been developing projects, actions and research with the LGBTQIA+ population deprived of liberty and released from the prison system of Mato Grosso state.
